

What do Medical Records and Health Information Technicians do?

Medical records and health information technicians have a unique job in health care, because their work does not involve direct personal care. These employees work in the area of medical records. They manage and organize medical data, ensuring their accuracy and security. They can also track patterns of disease, treatment outcomes, and maintain and update software. Health info techs can also specialize in types of information, such as in medical coding or in maintaining cancer registrars.

Health Information Techs are in demand in Livingston County!

Livingston County employment of health information technicians is expected to increase through 2020. The U.S. **Bureau of Labor Statistics** recognizes the job outlook for health information techs as growing much faster than average.

Training & Educational Opportunities

You will have plenty of employment opportunities as a medical records or health information technician, but first you will need to earn a certificate as a coding associate. As part of your classroom training and laboratory work you will learn about medical terminology, anatomy and physiology, health data requirements and standards, classification and coding systems, healthcare statistics and computer systems.

As a Medical Records or Health Information Technician you will:

- Consult with doctors to investigate diagnoses
- Enter data, such as history and extent of disease, diagnostic procedures, and treatment into computer \triangleright Use computer software to determine how much
- Identify, compile, and code patient data, using standard classification systems
- Supervise information clerks and medical transcriptionists in large offices or hospitals
